It also good news that there will ne change to worker exposure standards for softwood dust and isocyanates for now, with formal consultation to resume in early 2025.

# Worker Exposure Standards (WES) - no change for softwood dust and isocyanates

Thank you to WPMA members who contributed to the WorkSafe engagement meetings in May on softwood dust and isocyanates. WorkSafe has since advised that there will be <u>no</u> change to these WES in the next edition of the WES and Biological Exposure Indices (BEI) special guide due to be published in November this year. WorkSafe will be writing new WES reviews for softwood dust and isocyanates early to mid-2025. As usual, the period to receive submissions from stakeholders will run for approximately 3 months. WPMA has raised concerns directly with the Minister for Health and Safety, Brooke Van Velden, about the way WES and BEI are set. # Technical Manager for WPMA appointed to joint timber standards committees

Wood Processors and Manufacturers Association's Technical Manager, Jane Cuming, has been approved by the New Zealand Standards Approval Board to the following joint (AS/NZS) standards committees as a new participant:

- TM-010 Timber Structures and Framing;
- TM-011 Engineered Timber Products; and
- TM-012 Timber Grading and Preservation.

Joint standards are important tools for ensuring timber products and timber structures are safe, fit-for-purpose, and reliable. Having Jane on the committees will ensure WPMA and our members voices are heard in the development and implementation of these important standards.

# **Boosting Wood Processing - New Zealand's Second Emissions Reduction Plan**

The recently released Second Emissions Reduction Plan (ERP2) highlights that 'Boosting Wood Processing' would play a significant role in enabling New Zealand to meet our emissions reduction commitments through the production of more long-lived wood products that can store carbon during their lifetime. This in turn will also expand the economy and provide regional jobs and export potential by generating more high-value products. Acknowledging the important role wood used in construction plays in storing carbon, the report highlights that Government is committed to addressing any regulatory barriers to enable building with wood. This is positive for future policy settings – though early days and still much to work through with government. #### Wood declared an Environmental Good under new Trade Agreement

Increased export opportunities through the removal of tariffs for 41 wood products included within the Agreement on Climate Change, Trade and Sustainability has been welcomed by New Zealand's wood processing and manufacturing industry. Not only will this new trade agreement deliver commercial benefits for New Zealand, but it will send a strong environmental message to our trading partners. As new countries join the collective formed by New Zealand, Switzerland, Costa Rica and Iceland, the potential to grow a commercial benefit to our wood products industry and tackle climate change over time is significant. # Mass Timber adoption increases within New Zealand construction

A significant upsurge in mass timber awareness and application was highlighted by the Building Research Association of New Zealand (BRANZ) in its survey of building and construction experts. The finding is encouraging and signals an increased adoption of engineered timber products in New Zealand by builders, designers and architects. The timber that we are talking about is not only renewable but has environmental advantages over steel and concrete when it comes to carbon storage and durability. With New Zealand's sustainable forestry model, using locally grown timber supports our circular bio-economy, climate change targets, and domestic processing of logs. The BRANZ survey is supported by Mid-Rise Construction <a href="https://midrisewood.co.nz/">https://midrisewood.co.nz/</a>, a co-investment programme between MPI and Red Stag, which is stimulating the use of mass-timber engineered wood products in construction. #### New Zealand's Legal Harvest Assurance system - Opportunity to provide feedback

The Forests (Legal Harvest Assurance) Amendment Act 2023 will introduce a legal harvest assurance system into law through the Forest Act 1949. MPI are using issues papers to gather a broad base of views on the design of the details for how the legal harvest assurance system will work in practice. The information they gather will be used to inform options for consultation on regulations to implement the legal harvest assurance system.
